The Tech Industry Responds to COVID-19

- Google will allow free access to the enterprise version of Hangouts Meet to all G Suite and G Suite for Education users. That plan includes up to 250 users per call, the ability to record meetings, and livestream capabilities for up to 100,000 viewers until July 1, 2020.
- Microsoft has shared how schools can ramp up remote learning programs quickly with Microsoft Teams. The company has also started offering a free trial of the premium plan for its Teams chat app. That trial will allow users to record meetings and take advantage of 1TB of storage, neither of which are available on the normal free version. 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• Cisco is offering a <u>free version of its Webex service</u> with no time restrictions. In addition, it will allow up to 100 meeting participants and has added toll-free dial-in features with a 90-day license for organizations that are not already customers.
